The condition for payment of this contribution is to sign <u>all</u> attendance sheets at the event. No supporting documents are needed. The amount of the contribution will be determined by the <u>EU unit cost calculation guidelines</u> (https://ec.europa.eu/info/funding-tenders/opportunities/docs/2021-2027/common/guidance/unit-cost-decision-travel_en.pdf). - The travel costs contribution is based on the distance from the participant's <u>place of work</u> to the seminar location and will <u>not</u> take account of the participant's actual travel costs. - Travel costs from <u>outside</u> Hungary: participants can calculate the contribution to which they will be entitled on the European Commission website (https://era-comm.eu/go/calculator). - For those travelling <u>within</u> Hungary, the contribution for travel is fixed at 28€ (for a distance between 50km and 400km). Please note that no contribution will be paid for travel under 50km. - The <u>accommodation cost</u> in Hungary is set at 105 Euro/night. - Successful applicants will be sent the relevant claim form and information on how to obtain payment of the contribution to their expenses. Please note that <u>no payment</u> is possible if the registered participant cancels their participation for any reason.
